That this House declines to give a Second Reading to the Immigration and Social Security Co-ordination (EU Withdrawal) Bill because the Bill fails to secure the rights of British citizens to live, work and study in other EU Member States and the rights of EU citizens to do likewise in the UK; fails to fully guarantee the rights of British citizens across the EU and EU citizens already in the UK; fails to establish an immigration system to replace free movement that would allow businesses and public services to recruit the workers they need; contains no provisions to dismantle the hostile environment or to make the immigration system simpler and fairer; and denies parliamentary sovereignty by granting excessive powers to the Government to make changes to immigration law without primary legislation.

That this House declines to give a Second Reading to the Immigration and Social Security Co-ordination (EU Withdrawal) Bill because it ends free movement of people, despite free movement bringing huge benefits for the UK and for UK citizens as well as for EU nationals, because the Bill is inconsistent with continued membership of the European Union, because the Bill is premature in that the White Paper consultation on future immigration policy is scheduled to last until the end of 2019, because the Bill provides the Government with unreasonably broad powers of delegated legislation, because the Bill fails to provide sufficient protections and guarantees for EU citizens already in the UK and will instead subject them to the risk of hostile environment measures introduced in previous immigration legislation and other unacceptable policies, because the Bill fails to recognise the hugely negative impact that ending free movement of people would have on Scotland, and because the Bill fails to provide a differentiated migration policy for Scotland or to devolve immigration powers so that the Scottish Government and Parliament can take the necessary action to reverse the damage these measures would cause.

That this House declines to give a Second Reading to the Immigration and Social Security Co-ordination (EU Withdrawal) Bill because it hands the Home Secretary a blank cheque to change immigration laws and to remove individual rights with minimal scrutiny, brings an end to freedom of movement for EEA nationals and their family members, does not include automatic provision for EEA citizens currently living in the UK to be granted permanent settled status, fails to set out a human rights framework for the future immigration system, introduces salary thresholds which risk creating further staffing crises in the UK's public services, including the NHS and social care, and will bring a further three million citizens into an immigration system that remains unfit for purpose following the serious flaws exposed by the Windrush scandal.

(3) The Public Bill Committee shall have leave to sit twice on the first day on which it meets.

(4) Proceedings on Consideration and any proceedings in legislative grand committee shall (so far as not previously concluded) be brought to a conclusion one hour before the moment of interruption on the day on which proceedings on Consideration are commenced.

(5) Proceedings on Third Reading shall (so far as not previously concluded) be brought to a conclusion at the moment of interruption on that day.

(6) [Standing Order No. 83B](#) (Programming committees) shall not apply to proceedings on Consideration and up to and including Third Reading.

(7) Any other proceedings on the Bill may be programmed.

Voting by proxy for parental absence (Temporary Standing Order)

(1) A Member may, by reason of absence from the precincts of the House for childbirth or care of an infant or newly adopted child, arrange for their vote to be cast in accordance with this order by another Member acting as a proxy (a proxy vote).

(2) A proxy vote may be cast:

(a) in a division in the House, in Committee of the whole House, or in any legislative grand committee, in relation to the business specified in paragraph (3) below;

(b) on business specified in paragraph (3) below recorded in a division under Standing Order No. 41A (Deferred divisions), and

(c) in a ballot cast in an election under Standing Order No. 1B (Election of Speaker by secret ballot), Standing Order No. 2A (Election of the Deputy Speakers) and Standing Order No. 122B (Election of select committee chairs).

(3) Subject to paragraph (4) below, a proxy vote may be cast on all public and private business of the House.

(4) No proxy vote shall be cast in a division on any motion in the form specified in section 2(2) of the Fixed-term Parliaments Act 2011.

(5) No proxy vote shall be reckoned in the numbers participating in a division for the purposes of (a) Standing Order No. 41(1) (Quorum), and (b) Standing Order No. 37 (Majority for closure or for proposal of question).

(6) A proxy vote may be cast only if the Speaker has certified that the Member for whom the vote is to be cast is eligible under the terms of this order and the Resolution of the House of Monday 28 January and if that certificate, including the name of the Member nominated as a proxy, has been published in the Votes and Proceedings.

(7) A vote cast by a proxy shall be clearly indicated as such in the division lists published under the authority of the House.

(8) This Standing Order shall lapse upon the expiry of the proxy voting scheme established under the terms of this order and the Resolution of the House of Monday 28 January.
