That this House declines to give the European Union (Withdrawal Agreement) Bill a Second Reading because it fails to provide the Senedd with the opportunity to consent to future Free Trade Agreements, which will impact on devolved competencies, because it does not offer the people of the United Kingdom the opportunity to have their say on the deal in a second referendum and it fails to provide access to the Customs Union and Single Market, which will likely lead to increasing tariffs negatively impacting on Welsh

businesses, jobs and the economy more widely, because the Government's failure to publish the relevant impact assessments means that Members of Parliament are not being given the full information on the deal's impact and because the United Kingdom must not leave the EU before gaining the legislative consent of the Senedd.
